On October 18<sup>th</sup>, about 7 million people took to the streets to protest. No Kings!

On November 23<sup>rd</sup>, we celebrate Christ the King Sunday (aka the Reign of Christ Sunday). Yes, Christ the King!



In our culture, "king" is a troublesome concept. Our country was founded as a democracy, precisely because of the abuses of a king. Two hundred and 49 years later, the language around "king" and "kingdom" is uncomfortable or misunderstood. Yet on the last Sunday of the church year, we acknowledge that as Christians, there is a King to whom we owe our allegiance: Christ.

Christ is a very different kind of king. Kings throughout history seek to serve themselves first. Decisions which benefit their nation serve to preserve it as a source of their power and wealth. In 1 Samuel 18:10-20, God warns the Israelites, who want a king like all the other nations, that a king will wield the power of life and death over them, taking for himself (in the name of the country) the best of their fields, vineyards, orchards, and livestock. He will amass wealth from their labor and take their children to serve his armies and palace. The Biblical witness, and the witness of history proves this. The security they seek by having a king comes at a high price.

Christ is a very different kind of king. King of all Kings, Ruler of the Universe, Christ lays aside his own glory (Philippians 2:6-1) to become a Servant King, laying his own interests in order to tend to the needs of the people. Christ is the King who cares for the people as a shepherd for the sheep, giving up everything, even his life, for the benefit of the world. In Christ, we find true security and freedom.

When we sing of Christ as King, it is this self-giving King we praise. This is the King to whom we give our allegiance. Thanks be to God!
